Estate Planning After Divorce

The emotional turmoil of divorce can be overwhelming or liberating, depending on the client's perspective. But in addition to the divorce itself, there are other things that need to be cared for now that the union of two people has ended. Attorneys who practice domestic law should consider advising clients to review their Estate Plan, as part of the divorce process.

In most cases, the husband and wife seeking to dissolve their marriage are no longer interested in their ex-spouse being the beneficiary of their estate, and want to protect their children in the event that either parent remarries following divorce. If the original plan was to leave everything to their spouse and then to their children, their spouse may still get everything if the estate plan is not modified following divorce.

When preparing a Separation and Property Settlement Agreement, counsel and clients may want to consult with an Estate Planner to insure that proper decisions are made.

Beneficiary designations for the following financial instruments must be reviewed, drafted and corrected as needed:

1. Employee Retirement Plans
2. Individual Retirement Accounts (IRA)
3. Life Insurance
4. Annuities
5. Health Savings Accounts
6. Investment Accounts
7. Bank Accounts
8. Last Will and Testament
9. Health Power of Attorney
10. Trust

11. Durable Power of Attorney

In a perfect world, if something happens to one parent, the other parent would assume custody or guardianship of minor children. However, that may not be feasible or desirable after a divorce. In that case other arrangements may be necessary and should be incorporated into the Estate Planning process. For example, there may be concerns that money provided for the child or children may not be spent for the intended purpose. The parent can prepare a Revocable Living Trust with directions to the Trustee to be paid directly for the benefit of the children and to carry out the grantor's wishes. This would prevent the monies getting into the hands of the ex-spouse's new spouse should he or she remarry. A properly worded Testamentary Trust may also resolve this concern, as part of a Last Will and Testament.

In many cases, the family law attorney is not well versed in estate planning issues. His or her focus is to help the client dissolve the marriage and make decisions regarding asset distribution, custody, child-support and other issues. Estate planning attorneys can work closely with family law attorneys to conclude the final step of the dissolution.

Dean Sworn in as Domestic and Juvenile Master

On July 15, 2011, the three judges of the Circuit Court for Wicomico County convened in special session for the appointment of Karen M. Dean, Esquire, as Master of Domestic Relations and Juvenile Causes. Members of the bar, courthouse staff and special guests of Master Dean were in attendance. Master Dean was selected by a committee headed by the Honorable W. Newton Jackson, Jr., from a large pool of well-qualified applicants. Master Dean received her undergraduate degree from the University of Delaware in 1996 and her law degree from the Vermont Law School in 1999. She began her legal career as a law clerk with a Judge of the Superior Court in Pennsylvania.

Upon completion of her clerkship, Master Dean accepted a position as a staff attorney with the Salisbury office of the Legal Aid Bureau, Inc. In her four years as a Legal Aid staff attorney, Master Dean handled a variety of civil matters, including family law cases. In 2005, Master Dean accepted a position as an Assistant State's Attorney in Somerset County. In 2007, she was appointed to serve as Deputy State's Attorney for Somerset County, a position she held until January 2011, when she became a felony prosecutor in the Wicomico County State's Attorney's office.

In selecting Master Dean for the appointment, the selection committee recognized her strong litigation skills and experience handling both family law and juvenile law cases. Master Dean will be presiding over juvenile court and family law cases and will be responsible, with the Administrative Judge, for implementation of the Family Law case management plan.

In addition, she will be working with the Administrative Judge to oversee the Family Services Office, which is housed within the Master's Office. As Master, she will also be primarily responsible for presiding over meetings of the



Juvenile Coordinating Council, where members of Executive Branch child-serving agencies meet with the Court regarding juvenile court matters. Master Dean will also be presiding over the Truancy Reduction Pilot Program in the First Judicial Circuit.

News from the District Court

Due to transfers and promotions, District Court has several new faces and position changes. Cassandra Lawson joined our Courtroom Clerk team as a Lead Courtroom Clerk on June 1, 2011. Cassandra was most recently a Courtroom clerk in Ocean City District Court. Kandise Saykalay joined our staff on June 29, 2011 as our cashier. Kaley McCune was promoted to the Courtroom Clerk team on June 15, 2011, and Brenda Becker transferred from the Civil Department to the Criminal Traffic Department. We are still working on filling another civil clerk position as well as a Drug Court Case Manager.

We began our "summer schedule" on July 1, 2011. This means Courtroom 3 will only have a Wednesday docket scheduled until January 1, 2012, when we will reopen Courtroom 3 four days a week.

Notice of the Appointment of a Part-Time Magistrate Judge in the United States District Court, District of Maryland

The United States District Court for the District of Maryland is now accepting applications for a part-time United States Magistrate Judge position in Salisbury.

The basic jurisdiction of the United States Magistrate Judge is specified in 28 U.S.C. § 636 et seq. This position is designated as Salisbury and has primary responsibility for Somerset, Wicomico and Worcester Counties, Assateague Island National Seashore and Chincoteague National Wildlife Refuge. This includes the portions thereof situated in the Eastern District of Virginia, Wallops Island National Wildlife Refuge and Watts Island National Refuge which lie in the Eastern District of Virginia, and those areas under the operational control of the Commander, U.S. Coast Guard Group Eastern Shore including those areas situated in the Eastern District of Virginia, with travel to other locations within the state of Maryland as required.
